

2019 WOMEN'S LEARNING EXPEDITION REPORT

24 - 26 OCTOBER 2019

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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The 2019 Women's Learning Expedition (WLE) hosted by the African Women's Movement (AWM) was the second instalment where the inaugural gathering was held on 24-26 May 2018. The meeting of young women leaders was held to a rousing reception from a select group of invitees in Kigali, Rwanda. Unlike the 2018 edition, this year, the event was held in October due to the timing of the South African 2019 national elections.

With the 2019 WLE, AWM opened and examined the following new vistas of change:

- The size of the delegation was reduced to facilitate more robust engagement;
- The learning material was more targeted and thoroughly prepared;
- A tour of Kigali was incorporated in the programme to contextualise the visit;
- A visit to the parliament to engage with the Rwandese Members of Parliament for a one on one engagement was included;
- Issuing of attendance certificates at the closing dinner was embraced;

In 2019, 64% of the delegates were African women chartered accountants (up from 11% in 2018). This included Zama Khanyile, the President of the African Women Chartered Accountants (AWCA), Nolitha Pietersen, the Chairperson of the Eastern Cape branch of the Advancement of Black Accountants of Southern Africa (ABASA) as well as the Deputy Dean of the University of South Africa's (Unisa) College of Accounting Sciences (CAS), Mandisa Gandela. The 2019 WLE also had Mmabatho Maboya in attendance, the CEO of the Cyril Ramaphosa Foundation (CRF) who was a returning delegate from the 2018 initiative – it was encouraging for us to get her thumps up on the last day of the expedition as we were driving to the airport.

The congregation of young South African women leaders to draw knowledge from another African country that is thriving were gender equality is concerned, proved that the 2019 WLE did indeed serve its purpose as a platform for learning.



2. OBJECTIVES AND FORMAT

The selection of Rwanda as the African country to visit for the 2019 WLE was based on the ranking as per the World Economic Forum's (WEF) Global Gender Gap Index. Since 2006, the Global Gender Gap Index seeks to measure the relative gaps between women and men across four key areas: health, education, economy and politics (whereas AWM's key focus is on the economy and politics). The 2018 report benchmarked 149 countries across the globe with the following rankings for three top African countries:

- i. Rwanda (ranked 6th)
- ii. Namibia (ranked 10th)
- iii. South Africa (19th)

The index provides a comprehensive set of data and a clear method for tracking gaps on critical indicators so that countries may set priorities within their own economic, political and cultural contexts.

With South Africa being ranked 19, AWM identified Rwanda as leaders in Africa in distributing resources more equitably between women and men thus serving as the ideal hosts for the 2019 WLE that was held from 24-26 October 2019. The core purpose was to explore ways in which the South African ranking can be improved; so as to bring about genuine change in gender dynamics not only in the workplace but in society as a whole.

In light of the Gender Based Violence (GBV) South Africa has been experiencing recently, there were definitely key learnings taken from the expedition in terms of policies and legislation presented by the MPs that are deliberately designed to protect and develop the women in Rwanda.

According to a Forbes¹ article titled '6 Ways Travel Can Jumpstart (And Advance) Your Career', traveling assists one to get a clearer perspective on life as a whole, gives one a better understanding of people, assists one in eliminating the fear of asking questions as well as learning to handle the unexpected better (being solution orientated).

The WLE, by design, is meant to take South African emerging women leaders out of their comfort zones to emerge as global leaders who are exposed to the challenges and opportunities the continent as well as the world at large has to offer. On 30 May 2019, Africa made history as the agreement establishing the African Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA) officially entered into force – this is the largest trading block since the formation of the World Trade Organisation. It therefore becomes that much more important for women in South Africa to be exposed to the continent to benefit in this regard.

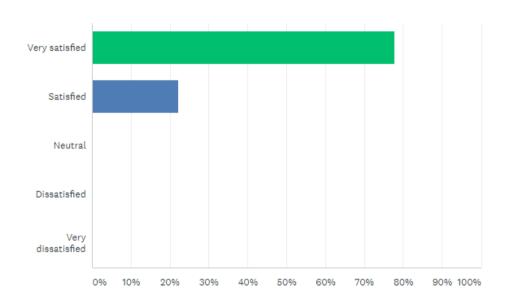

6. FEEDBACK

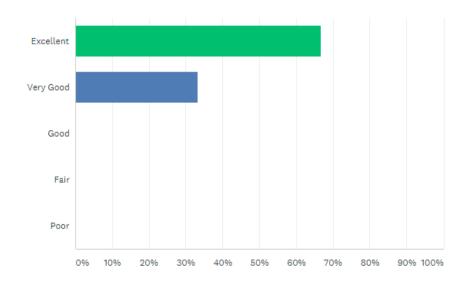
Upon returning from the expedition, a survey with 10 questions was sent to the delegates. Please refer to the detailed Monkey Survery results report for more detail.

Question 4: What did you like most about the event? (This was an open ended question.)

The delegates seemed to have generally embraced the learning experience and particularly enjoyed the interaction with the Rwandese especially during Umuganda – the community work day. One attendee mentioned 'One can juxtapose many similarities between Rwanda's history and South Africa. Though deeply painful Rwandans have manage to reconcile their painful past and rally together behind one vision.' The delegates were also impressed by the presentation contents rated really good as per question 3 of the survey. These provided clarity on policy approaches that Rwanda is taking for gender equality

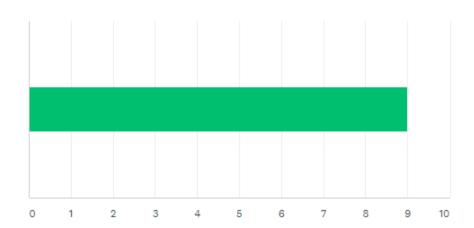
Question 5: What did you like least about the event? (This was an open ended question.)

The key area of improvement would seem to be time management. A number of delegates stated this as a dominant area of improvement.

Question 6: How do you think this event could have been improved? (This was an open ended question.)

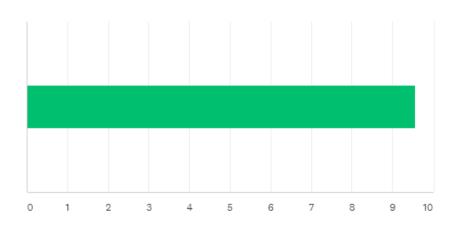
The time management again was dominant in this question.

Question 9: Do you have any other suggestions or comments to help us improve our future events?

The recommendations for this question included more diverse women in terms of ethnicity and age. The time management was also an area noted for improvement where some ladies would have loved to have more time to explore by themselves.

Question 10: Name a country you would recommend for us to host future Women's Learning Expeditions?

In 2018, Ghana was the dominant country the ladies wanted to explore. In 2019, Ghana came out tops again with two mentions. As a result, we have started engaging with Samia Nkrumah, the daughter of the first President of Ghana, Honourable Kwame Nkrumah. In 2020, we aim to take approximately 50 ladies to Ghana.

7. 2020 WOMEN'S LEARNING EXPEDITION

In honouring the last question of the survey about where the ladies wish to go next, the 2020 Women's Learning Expedition will be held in Accra, Ghana. This will be held in partnership with the Chief Luthuli Museum who will also be hosting their annual Albert Luthuli Memorial Lecture at the same time. As mentioned above, we have started engaging with Ms Samia Nkrumah, the daughter of the first President of Ghana, Honourable Kwame Nkrumah. In 2020, we aim to take approximately 50 ladies to Ghana.

8. CONCLUSION

It is worth noting that the following publicity is yet to be implemented for the 2019 WLE in alignment with the 2018 expedition:

- Event highlighting outcomes to be hosted at Sanlam in March 2020 inviting delegates and sponsors to speak as well as potential attendees for 2020;
- A feature on ASA magazine;
- Social media engagement promoting the event were sponsors will be further acknowledged;
- Screening of a 10 minute video of interviews of delegates while in Kigali with sponsor backdrop.

If the WLE 2019 has demonstrated anything concrete, it is the need among African women in leadership to unite in sharing best practice. To add on, following were some of the major outcomes of expert sessions and meets:

- To overcome collective challenges together with planned synchronisation.
- To ensure there are more diverse delegates the next year including men.
- To include online resources, Al and apps to effectively manage data seepage.
- Designing more accurate and better managed action plans for the future, with strict attention paid to the timelines in question.
- Improving branding options for sponsors.
- Planning for long-term solutions to recurring issues which are common to multiple countries.
- Finally, making women believe in themselves and placing them in good stead for what can be an uneven journey.

During Umuganda, the delegates appreciated how selfless community building would impact not merely their shared future, but also determine that of the world. It was encouraging to see Rwandese participate in this initiative despite the pouring rain and muddy roads. The delegates saw another side of Rwanda, one that is often hidden by its riddled history and its splendid natural beauty. They saw the unexplored business horizon of the country and how far it stretched.
